We thank the Friends of Pool 9 members that took the time to complete and submit a ballot. FOP9 Receives Appreciation Letter For Handicapped Ramp

Friends of Pool 9 donated \$3,000 toward the construction of the handicapped boat loading ramp at Village Creek Landing in 2019. The concrete loading ramp along the south side of the launch area allows handicapped individuals to be placed in the boat while it is still on the boat trailer. The following letter of appreciation was received from the family of a "user" via Iowa DNR Biologist Karen Osterkamp.

"I write to you today to enormously thank you for installing the handicapped boat loading ramp in Lansing. I cannot thank you enough for the joy it gave my Dad to be able to get into a boat and be back on the Mississippi River where he has spent over 65 years fishing.

He's 87 now and cared for my Mom throughout her Alzheimer's that took her life in 2017 and then following her death he suffered numerous health issues. For several years he has been unable to get into a boat safely due to poor balance and strength, yet has continued to yearn to fish on the Mississippi again. He frequently pined, "If I could just get in a boat..."

So yesterday my son took his boat and we took my Dad with his 3 tackle boxes and 4 poles to Lansing from Waterloo to try the ramp and it was fabulous. Wonderful!! It was very easy for him to navigate and get in and out of the boat and most importantly safely. The sun was shining, the fish were biting, life was good again.

The ramp was worth every penny plus a million - thank

you so much.

2020 Year in Review

The year began as other years with FOP9 volunteers being involved in numerous projects during the winter months. Board members attended a Lansing City Council meeting to discuss the possibility of a "Restricted Wake Zone" along the Lansing waterfront. It was approved by the Iowa DNR this fall and will be implemented in spring, 2021.

Members worked at the Genoa National Fish Hatchery Kids Ice Fishing Day, as well as several days on rebuilding the endangered clam cages, with the help of Annie Gallagher. Members also presented a kid's ice fishing and trapping event. Ric Zarwell continued to meet with Refuge Manager Sabrina Chandler and Reggie McLeod (Big River Magazine) to plan the 100 Year - Centennial (1924-2024) book for the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge.

Many of you were involved in another very successful Ferryville Eagle Day event (co-sponsored by FOP9). And a small group of researchers surveyed the eagle nesting sites in Pool 9. Data collected indicates 224 nests in the 31 mile-long pool, with 164 being classifies as active.

Scholarships were awarded to two Eastern Allamakee seniors, Kristi Dibert and Kinley Schobert, and three De Soto High School graduating seniors, Alex Boardman, Hunter Pedretti, and Marcus Connolly. On the river, beach fire rings were cleaned regularly and poison ivy was sprayed to accommodate river campers. We did not organize a Pool-wide river clean up event this year because of the covid 19 virus and our concern for a large number of people gathering at the VFW building, nor

did we place portable toilets at the landings. We had few Board meetings and wore masks and "distanced" from one another when we did meet. And once more, the Pat Sandry Memorial Fishing Tourney was a huge success, and we appreciate their donation to FOP9 in his name.

The collecting of nuts from river corridor trees took place for area nurseries, as well as limited tree restoration on the rebuilt islands at the lower end of Pool 9. The Board did offer a "cash back raffle" this year, as well as an end of year "merchandise sale" of FOP9 shirts and hats on our facebook page. We did not have a combined MRAD event for Lansing and De Soto students as in the past. And there was no Annual Meeting, because of the covid 19 virus. The Board sent out a "mail in" ballot to the membership with candidates willing to serve on the Board of Directors for a three year term and results are in another article in this newsletter. And the Board of Directors did have a "virtual" meeting in November to discuss the USFWS and Friends of Pool 9 Partnership Agreement that expires on 1/11/2022.

The year ended with a total of just over 500 volunteer hours for FOP9 and the Upper Miss Refuge. This is an unusually low number of hours compared to the average of more than 2,000 volunteer hours logged per year. Our total volunteer hours are over 37,000 for the Refuge in our 14 years of existence.

FOP9 Board Increases Number of Scholarships

The Friends of Pool 9 Board of Directors have voted to increase the number of FOP9/Tim Loose Scholarships they would like to give to Lansing and De Soto graduating seniors in 2021. The Board voted to give two 4-Year scholarships in the amount of \$500 each, as well as two \$500 scholarship for a 2-Year program, and one \$250 volunteer award. This amounts to \$2,250 available for each of the two high schools. These scholarships are available for graduating seniors at both Eastern Allamakee and De Soto High Schools.

Graduating seniors in Spring, 2021 should contact the Guidance Counselor at their respective high schools for more information and an application. The lone requirement for the 4 or 2 year scholarships is that a student be entering a science related field of study that focuses on the environment/natural resources and includes fisheries, wildlife, rivers and streams, forestry, ecology, agriculture, biology, chemistry or computer science.
